Named police officer for every neighbourhood

The newly announced 'Beating Crime Plan' includes ensuring that every neighbourhood in England and Wales has a named and contactable police officer dedicated to that neighbourhood.

The named police officer will know their area, the people and local communities who live there and are best placed to ensure that persistent crime and anti-social behaviour is tackled.

This looks like a definite step towards, and focus on, local neighbourhood policing which members have regularly stated that they feel has been lost and that they would like more focus on given the benefits to both local neighbourhoods and the police.

We will be working with the Police and Neighbourhood Watch Leads and Coordinators to ensure this promise becomes a reality and that the potential benefits of this are realised in all communities.

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Covid-19 and crime survey: overview and online security behaviour

This research, funded by UK Research and Innovation, was a collaboration between the Dawes Centre for Future Crime at UCL and Neighbourhood Watch.

COVID-19 AND CRIME SURVEY PART I: SURVEY OVERVIEW AND ONLINE SECURITY BEHAVIOUR







The aim was to understand how the Covid-19 pandemic affected crime in the UK, and the public's perception of it. The survey, which ran from 2nd - 23rd December 2020, received 20,784 responses from across the country, of which 14,741 (or 71%) provided answers to every question.

The pandemic has disrupted everyday life in many ways, some of which could increase the risk of crime, some of which could decrease it. The survey was thus designed to assess changes to people's activities, as well as their perceptions and experience of crime for the periods before and during the pandemic.

The survey questions were focused on:

- routine activities
- online habits and online safety
- victimisation and perceptions of crime
- · handling of the pandemic and
- demographics and social media use.

This PART 1 summary document describes the overall characteristics of those who completed the survey and some of the findings. It focuses on respondent's awareness of two crime preventon campaigns and provides a little detail about them for those that are not aware of them.

Further upcoming papers will cover perceptions of crime, victimisation experience and the handling of the pandemic.

Neighbourhood Watch and other expert organisations partner with AirBnb to launch UK's first Trust and Safety Alliance

Neighbourhood Watch is proud to partner with AirBnb in the UK and several other expert organisations as part of the newly launched UK Trust and Safety Alliance – a European first. The alliance will provide information and guidance to Hosts and the Airbnb community.

Other founding members of the Trust and Safety Alliance include the National Fire Chief's Council, Crimestoppers, Get Safe Online, the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents and Race on the Agenda.

The Alliance will engage with Airbnb Hosts quarterly through Airbnb's 'Meet the Experts' series and will produce safety, crime prevention and



community wellbeing guides and information on an ongoing basis.

John Hayward-Cripps, CEO, Neighbourhood Watch, said, "We are delighted to be working with Airbnb as part of their new Trust and Safety Alliance. Through this new relationship with Airbnb and the Alliance, we can support Hosts to be increasingly connected and involved with the communities where they are. We look forward to building on our shared values of community, safety and connection."

This partnership not only brings Neighbourhood Watch in front of a new, captive audience in the form of AirBnb hosts, but also enables us to further demonstrate the ways we can be a proactive contributor to community wellbeing and safety by working with dynamic partners and having a key voice on this national Alliance.

Amanda Cupples, General Manager for Northern Europe at Airbnb, said, "We are always looking for ways to enhance the safety of hosted travel in the UK and now have the backing of some of the leading safety organisations in the UK to help us achieve that goal. We have a long history of working together with expert organisations to bolster safety for our community, and the Alliance will help us to achieve more moving forward."

The Alliance is part of Airbnb's ongoing effort to make hosted travel the safest form of travel in the UK. Airbnb's recent steps include launching the Neighbour Support Line, removing or suspending so-called "party listings", introducing pilot booking restrictions to address problematic guest activity and more.

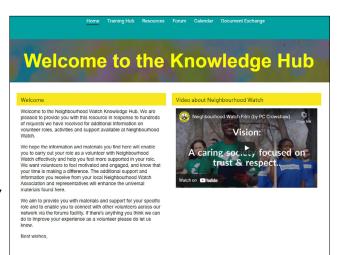
NEW!! Neighbourhood Watch Knowledge Hub

We're in the process of developing a Knowledge Hub – which will contain useful information to support local volunteers in their work. The Knowledge Hub will include sections on induction, training, a calendar of events, and also a forum where volunteers can communicate directly with each other.

As part of this project, we are developing various new materials, personal training resources

and development opportunities, which will bring a universal approach to what we do, while still enabling the flexibility you need locally. This includes an up-to-date Coordinators' role description, a tailored volunteer induction, volunteer training, and exploring how we can provide reward and improving the ways we recognise and reward volunteers both locally and centrally.

Cyberhood Watch research addresses public wi-fi and fake hotspot risks this summer

Research from 16,000 households across the UK suggests Brits connect to unprotected public Wi-Fi networks for convenience - despite feeling insecure and exposed

A new survey with 16,000 households in the UK has found that six in ten Brits regularly use public Wi-Fi, with over a quarter (28%) connecting to these unprotected networks despite feeling insecure and exposed and a further 23% willingly ignoring the risks in favour of convenience. The research, carried out as part of Cyberhood Watch, an initiative created by Neighbourhood Watch in partnership with Avast, a global leader in digital security and privacy, aimed to assess the current level of apathy among consumers when using public Wi-Fi and the risk of data loss this summer as cybercriminals look to exploit the regained sense of freedom among the British public as Covid-19 restrictions end.

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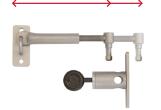
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
