The Toolbox - OHESC

The National Fire Chiefs Council in partnership with SafeLincs have produced a fantastic resource called the Online Home Fire Safety Check (OHFSC).

The website allows you answer questions about your (or someone else) home, allowing the system to assess how vulnerable you are to fire, and whether you would benefit from a fire safety visit. If so, you can give permission for your details to be forwarded to your local Fire & Rescue Service (General Data Protection Registration compliant).

The survey takes about five minutes, and does ask some personal questions (such as how messy you are, and if you use recreational drugs) but these things are asked to help keep you safe, not to judge you, so be honest.
