# **#NoPlaceforHate**

Throughout April and May, we'll be sharing resources and information on hate crimes - what a hate crime is, how to report them and the support available to victims of hate crime. Hate crime can and does effect anyone, however for this campaign we will be focusing on some specific types and the groups effected by them.

### WHAT IS A HATE CRIME?

A hate crime is any criminal offence that is motivated by hostility and prejudice towards a person's identity or perceived identity. The following are the five nationally monitored strands:

- Disability
- Race
- Religion/Faith
- Sexual Orientation
- Transgender Identity



Anyone can be affected by hate crime. You don't have to be a member of the group to which the hostility is targeted at. You don't have to be gay to have had homophobic abuse shouted at you. You may not be part of a religion and still have someone target you because they think you are.

Continuing on from last month's focus on **racist** and **disability-based** hate crimes, in May we will be sharing information and resources on supporting victims of **homophobic** and **transphobic** hate crimes, and **gender-based** hate crimes.

Hate crimes can have a devastating impact on the victim and their loved ones. Some hate crimes start as minor incidents, which can escalate into more serious and frequent offences. Where victims suffer a series of such incidents, the cumulative effect can destroy their lives through emotional damage and long-term trauma. People are made to feel like they don't belong and will often change their lifestyles or question their identities to try and avoid further incidents.

All hate crimes can be reported to the police - you can call the police on **999** if you or someone else are in immediate danger, or you can call 101 in a non-emergency. You can also anonymously report a hate crime to <u>CrimeStoppers</u>, visit a local police station, or report via <u>Stop Hate UK</u>.

## Tackling Antisocial Behaviour (ASB) in Chorley, Lancashire

Operation Centurion is a dedicated operation delivered by Lancashire Constabulary's Neighbourhood Policing Teams, supported by the force's newly established ASB, Prevention and Problem-Solving Command, to deliver targeted foot patrols in areas identified as ASB hotspots.

These extra patrols, provided by £2m of Government funding from the ASB Action Plan, and secured by the Police and Crime Commissioner, provide additional visible policing hours across the county to deal with ASB, tackle offending and deter further incidents.

#### Mr ZEE's Takeaway, Chorley



Local analysis identified an ASB hotspot area in Chorley which was affecting local businesses and causing disruption to the bus service, as well as in the local bus station.

Mr ZEE's takeaway was at the centre of all this, with a 40.5% increase in ASB incidents after opening, and had already required two Dispersal Orders to be authorised to try and tackle the problems in a short period of time.

To add to this, the owner of Mr ZEE's was also supplying illegal vapes to children and young people. He had developed an unhealthy friendship with young people in the area, enticing and encouraging antisocial behaviour, loitering, and regular disruption to others.

Members of the area's Community Safety Partnership worked closely together to address the problems surrounding Mr ZEE's. It was decided that Chorley Council would take the lead alongside Lancashire Police to gather and provide the evidence and supporting information needed to secure a closure order on the property. This partnership approach proved successful and a closure order for the premises was granted.

Following the closure of Mr ZEE's, the owner returned to the area the following day attempting to sell vapes in the street. He was immediately stopped from doing so, along with another male, thanks to police officers patrolling the area as part of Op Centurion. Since then, as part of Op Centurion, officers have continued to patrol the area on foot for many weeks to provide continued reassurance and support to affected parties including the bus station, local business owner, and the public.

The Constabulary has received acknowledgements and thanks from business owners who have previously complained regarding a perceived lack of action. ASB in the area has reduced significantly as the legacy and influence of Mr ZEE's has dwindled.

#### Inspector Mike Moys, Local Policing Inspector for Chorley and South Ribble:

"Antisocial behaviour is a blight on our communities and makes people feel unsafe in their homes and on the streets. The support we have given Chorley Council in securing this closure order displays our commitment to working closely with partner agencies to tackle all forms of ASB."

**Councillor Alistair Bradley, Leader of Chorley Council**: "We won't stand by while one business lets down everyone else working hard to make our town centre safe and welcoming. The order comes after our officers have attempted other options to come to a resolution, but unfortunately the business operators were not willing to work with us.

"I am pleased that we have been able to take decisive action by serving the order and thanks goes to the police for their support. I want to make it clear that we will not tolerate anti-social behaviour in any of its forms in our borough and we will do what we can day in and day out working with partners to make sure our community is safe."
