# 1. Introduction and Background

- 1.1 This survey has run since 2021 and was developed to better understand the impact of Neighbourhood Watch on levels of crime, fear of crime and feelings of safety. In addition, neighbourliness, community cohesion and the current reach and diversity of Neighbourhood Watch.
- 1.2 The original design of the survey was supported by University College London and informed by previous research from Nottingham Trent University into the Crime Survey of England and Wales.
- 1.3 The findings of the national survey will be used by Neighbourhood Watch Network as a national baseline and support the development and evaluation of the Neighbourhood Watch Strategy.

## 2. Methodology

- 2.1 The survey was conducted online using the Survey Monkey platform during November 2025. All responses were anonymised and were analysed in aggregated groups to avoid any attempt at identifying individuals or groups of people.
- 2.2 The survey was also shared with Neighbourhood Watch members and non-members via Neighbourhood Watch communication channels, Police force community messaging systems, press releases and social media. ***This methodology is a non-probability sampling technique, and the sample can therefore not be guaranteed as representative of the general population.***
- 2.3 We have removed – in most cases – ‘don’t know’ responses.
- 2.4 A total of 38,599 responses were received.

## 3. Executive Summary

- 3.1 The 2025 National Crime and Community Survey, conducted online in November 2025 with **38,599 total responses**, aims to understand the impact of Neighbourhood Watch on crime levels, fear of crime, and community cohesion.

### 3.2 Key Findings on Crime and Safety

- **Perceived Crime Increase:** 41.60% of respondents believe crime levels in their neighbourhood have risen in the past year, which is similar to the figure reported in the previous year's survey.

- **Feelings of Safety:** While a majority (68%) of all respondents feel safe or very safe, this is a significant drop from 80% in the 2024 survey. For NHW members the figure is 76%, which is significantly greater and also a little higher than last year – 74%.
- **Top Concerns:** The top three crimes respondents worry about experiencing are:
  1. Antisocial Behaviour (ASB) (66%)
  2. Burglary (Having your home broken into and something stolen) (49%)
  3. Cybercrime (45%)
- **Victim/Witness Experience:** 35% of people reported being a victim of, or witnessing, a crime in the past 12 months, which is slightly down from 36% in the previous year.
- **Crime Reporting:** There was a slight increase in people reporting crimes to the police (53.22% in 2025 vs. 51.30% in 2024). However, mistrust is strong among transgender and non-binary respondents, with 80% believing nothing would be done if they reported a crime.

### 3.3 Neighbourhood Watch Impact & Engagement

- **Trust in Advice:** 91.3% of respondents trust the crime prevention advice offered by Neighbourhood Watch, a result exactly in line with the 2024 survey.
- **Action Taken:** 79% of respondents have acted on or changed their behaviour after engaging with Neighbourhood Watch crime prevention advice/information, a slight improvement from 78% last year.
- **Neighbourliness & Communication: Neighbourhood Watch members** show higher levels of community engagement:
  - They are **15% more likely** to be part of a neighbourhood WhatsApp group (60% vs. 45%).
  - They are **15% more likely** to chat to their neighbours "on most days".
  - They are **12% more likely** to litter-pick in their locality than non-members.
  -
- **Safety Perception (Members):** 76% of Neighbourhood Watch members/volunteers feel safe or very safe.

### 3.4 Facial Recognition Technology (FRT)

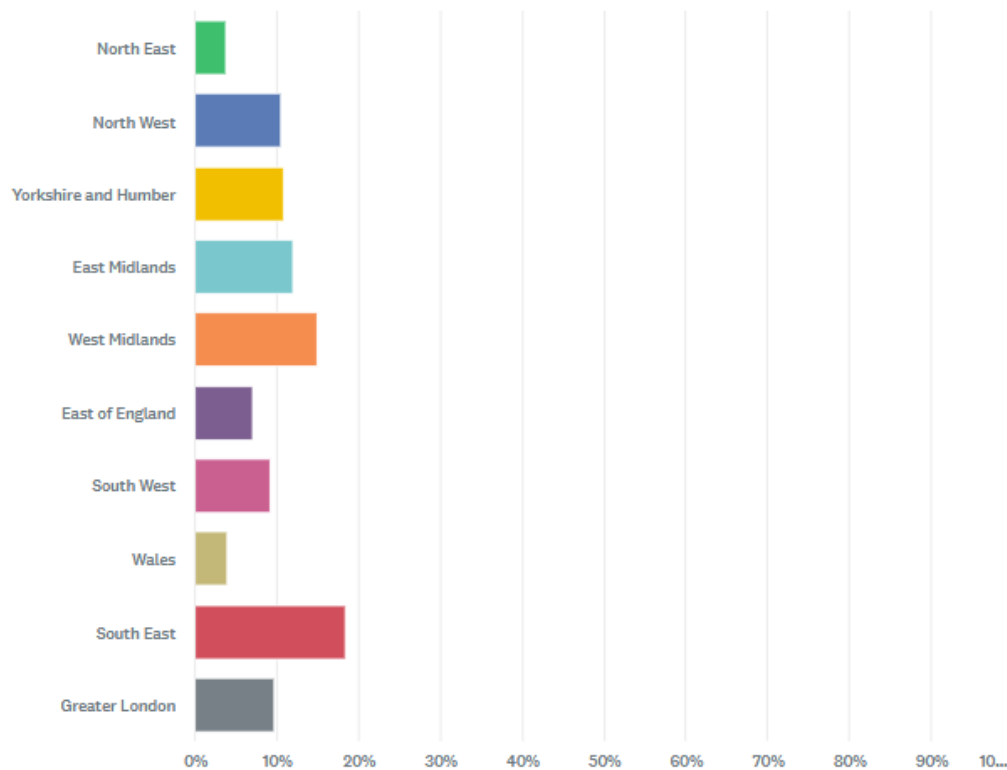
- **Support for Consultation:** 89% of respondents support a public consultation on the implementation of Facial Recognition Technology (with "don't know" responses removed).
- **Favouring Use:** 91% of respondents are generally in favour of using FRT for preventing or solving crime.
- **Comments:** Positive comments focused on catching criminals and believing innocent people have nothing to fear. Negative concerns included accuracy, problems with skin tones in imaging, invasion of privacy, and a general mistrust of agencies.

## Additional Notes

- 4.1 It should be noted that some of the same questions have been included in our surveys over the past years, and wherever possible, we have included the results to compare or to highlight any trends.

# Q1 Which Region do you live in?

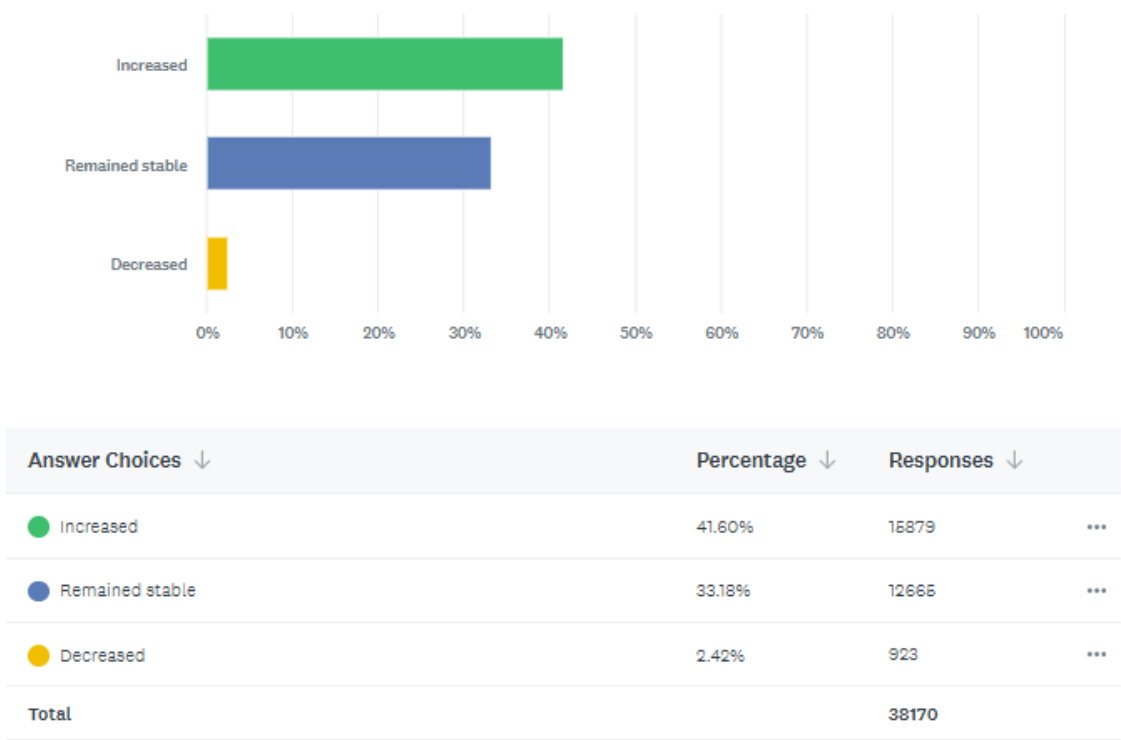

More respondents than last year came from Greater London (6% v 1%), South East (11% v 8%).

# Q2 In the past year do you think crime levels in your neighbourhood have risen?

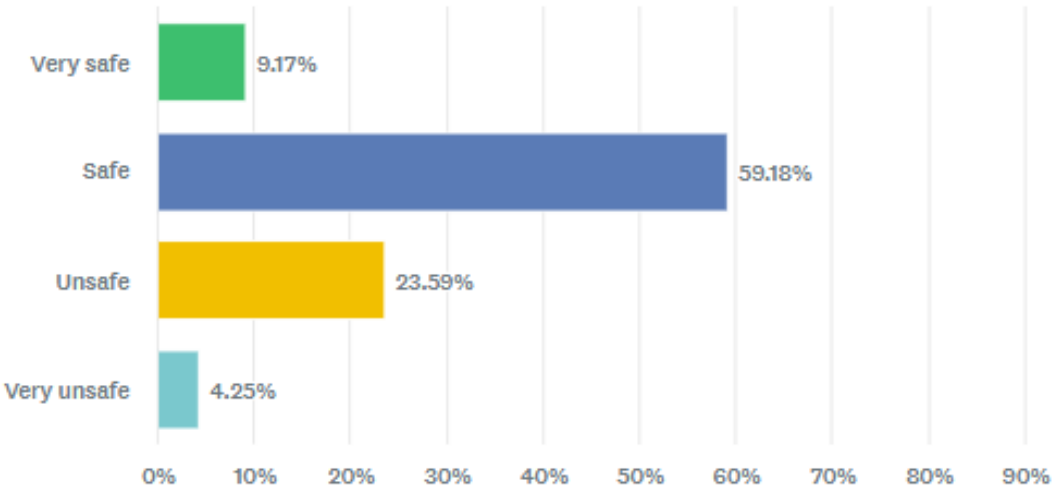

42% of respondents felt that crime levels in their neighbourhoods have increased – this is at a similar level to last year.

Whilst **68%** of all respondents feel safe or very safe, this is a significant (12%) change from last year when **80%** of all respondents felt safe or very safe.

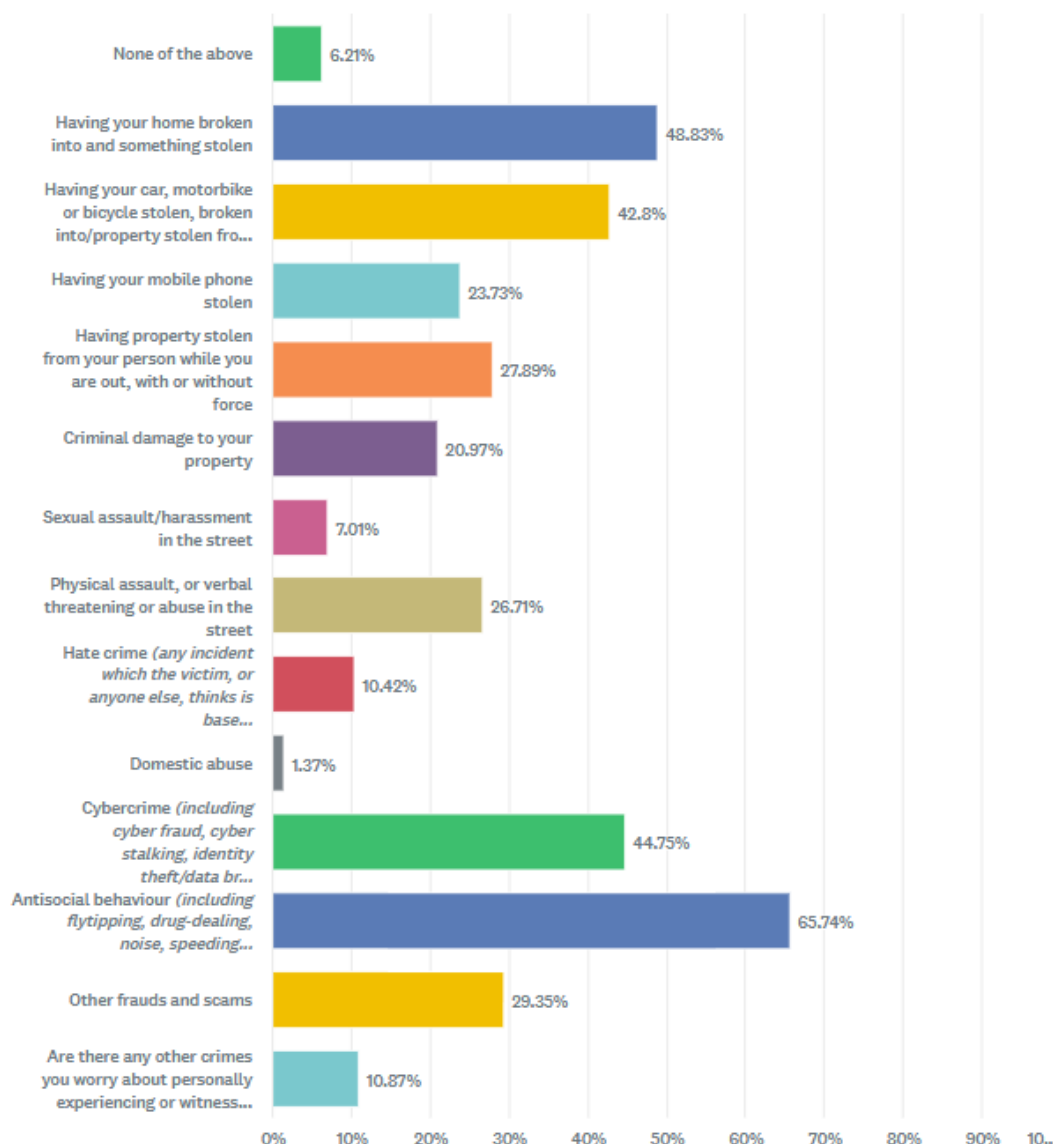
However, **76% of Neighbourhood Watch members/volunteers feel safe or very safe**, which follows the usual trend which we put down to members being in touch with their local police teams and conversant with the local crime statistics. This is down very slightly from last year – when it was 77% for Neighbourhood Watch members/volunteers.

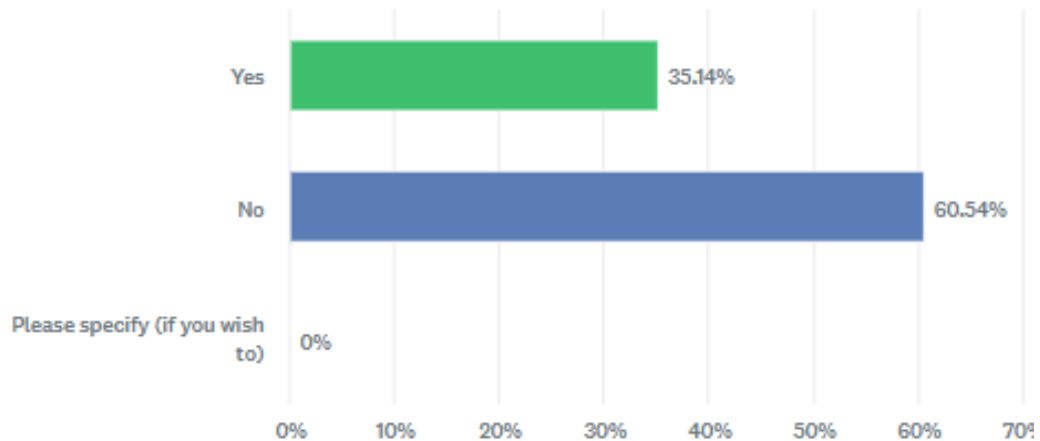


The top three crimes respondents worry about experiencing are ASB (66%), followed by Burglary (49%) and Cybercrime (45%). Six per cent of respondents do not worry about experiencing crime.

For Neighbourhood Watch members, their worries are in a slightly different order: ASB (65%), Cybercrime (49%) and Burglary (45%).

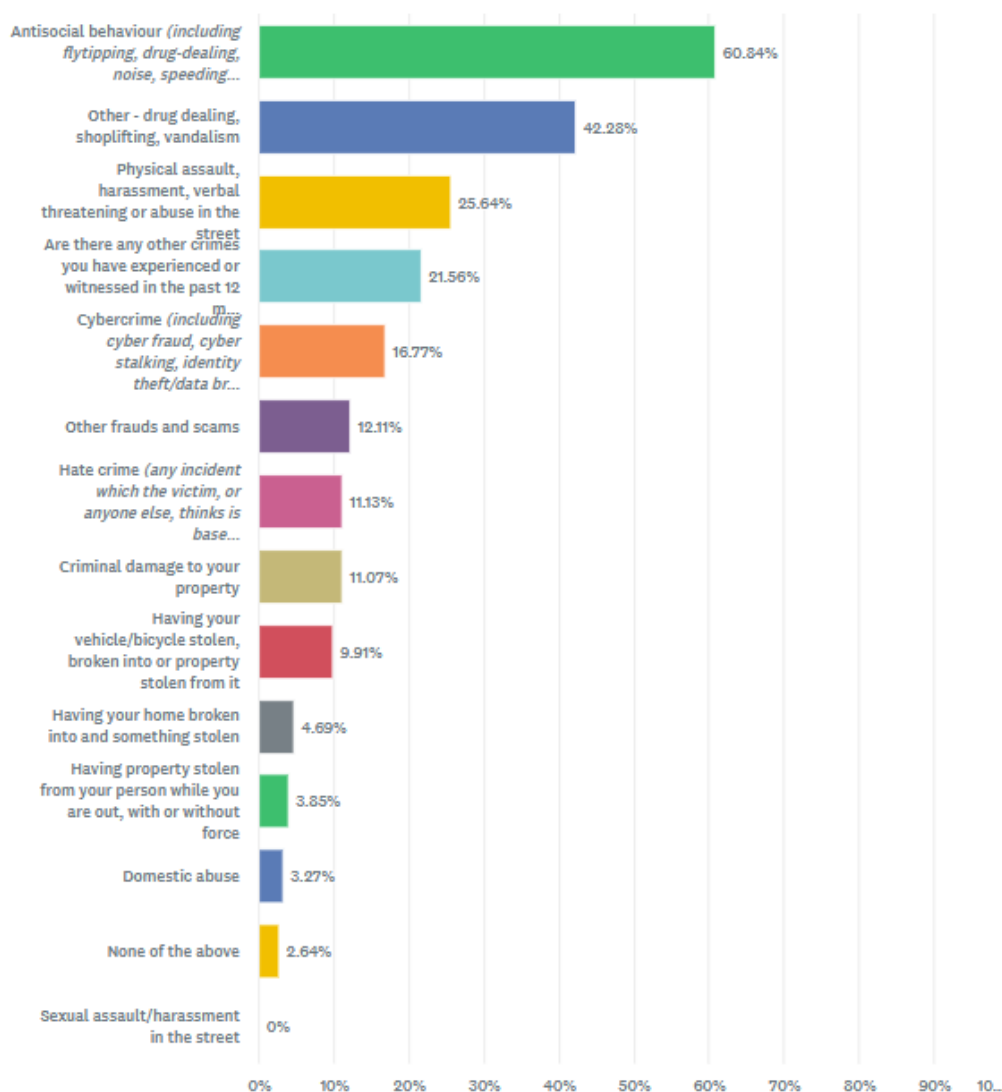


35% of people said they had experienced or witnessed crime in the past year. This is very slightly down on last year at 36%.

Please specify which crime(s) you have personally experienced or witnessed in the past 12 months? (please select all that apply)

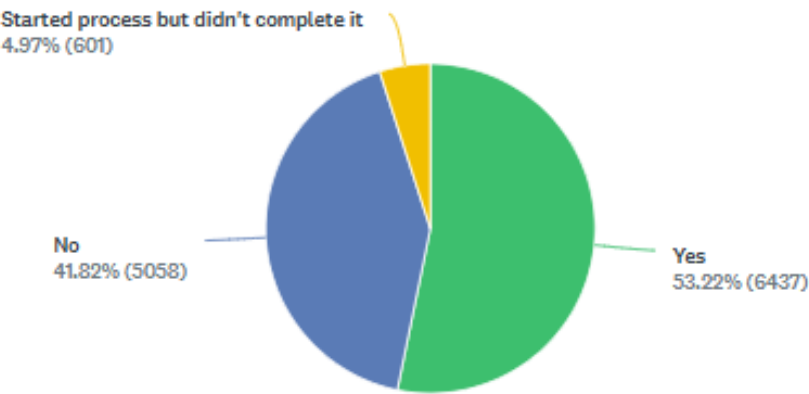
Answered: 13,191 Skipped: 24,979



Figures for experience of crime are very similar to those for the same categories last year. Notable differences are a slight increase in hate crime 11.13% this year, v 9.52% in 2024. This doubles to a rate of 23.41% for those identifying as Transgender, Non-binary or self-describing.

# Q7 Did you report the crime(s) to the police?

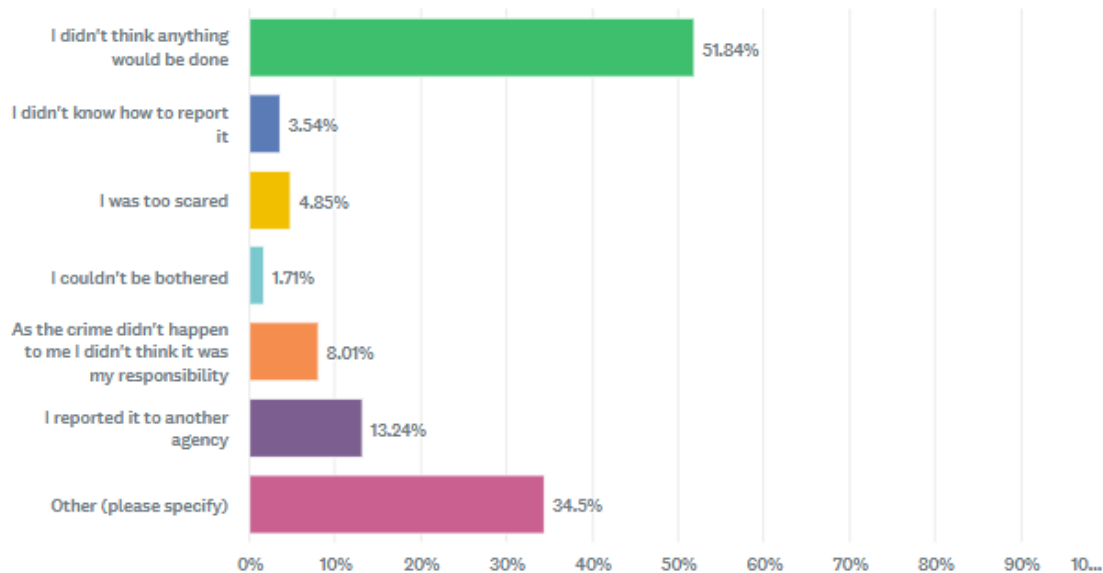

There is a small difference between this year and last year, with more people reporting and fewer not reporting or starting the process and not finishing.

When we look at Transgender, non-binary and self-describing respondents, 61% reported the incident to the police, with 35% not reporting and only 3.7% starting the process and not completing it. This would seem to demonstrate – to some degree – trust in the police for this group.

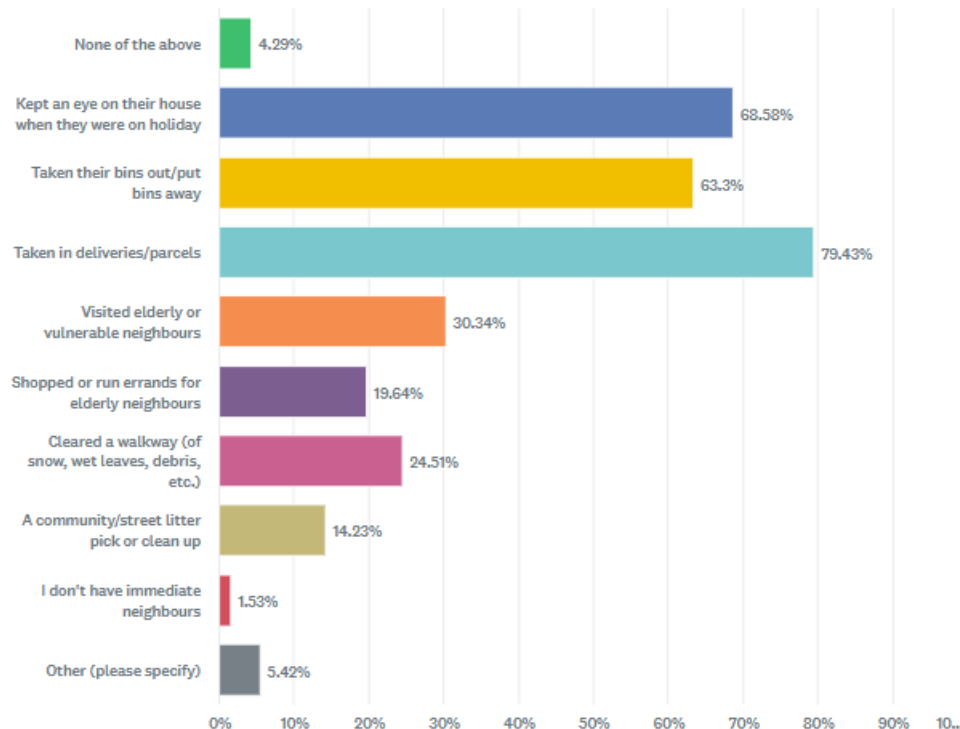


There are minor differences between the answers men and women gave but women were less likely to think that nothing would be done 47% v 52%. With transgender and non-binary respondents, the mistrust is much stronger, with 80% thinking nothing would be done.

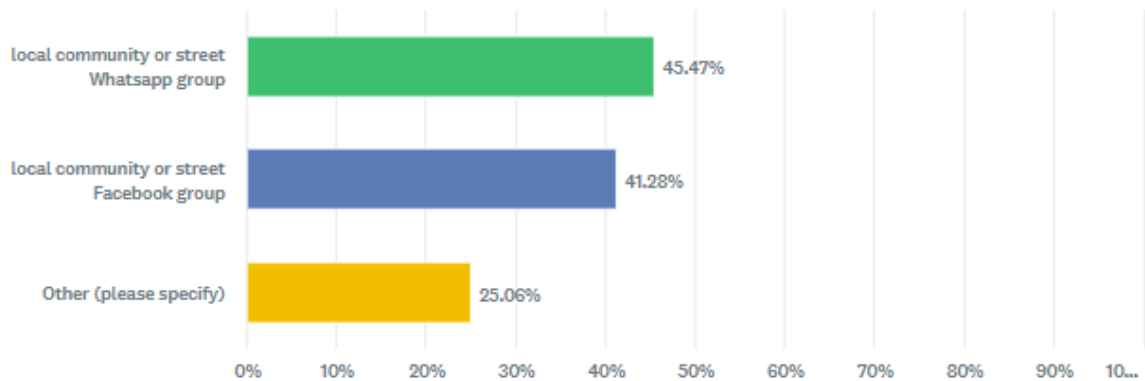
Women are a little more likely to take in parcels 81% v 79%.

Neighbourhood Watch members are 7% more likely to take bins in or out, and 7% more likely to shop or run errands for neighbours and a huge 12% more likely to litter-pick in their locality.

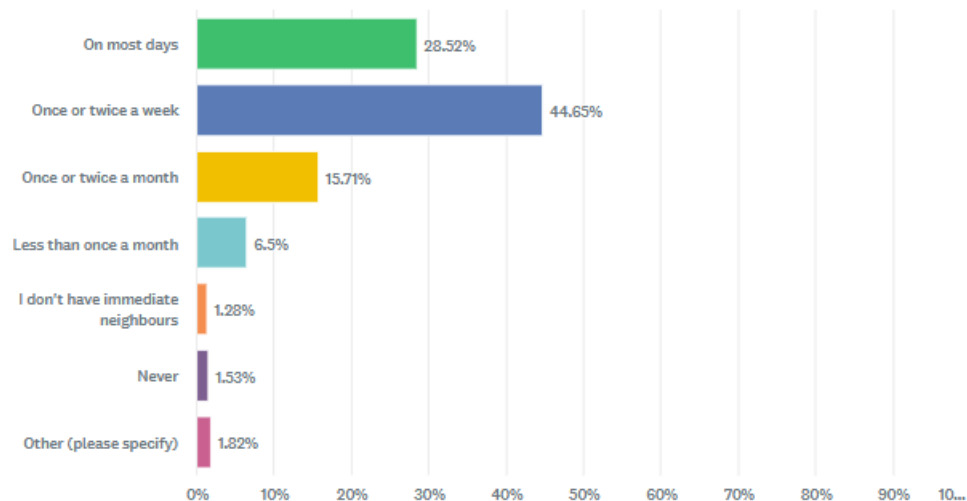


Neighbourhood Watch Members are 15% more likely to be part of a neighbourhood WhatsApp group (60% v 45%).

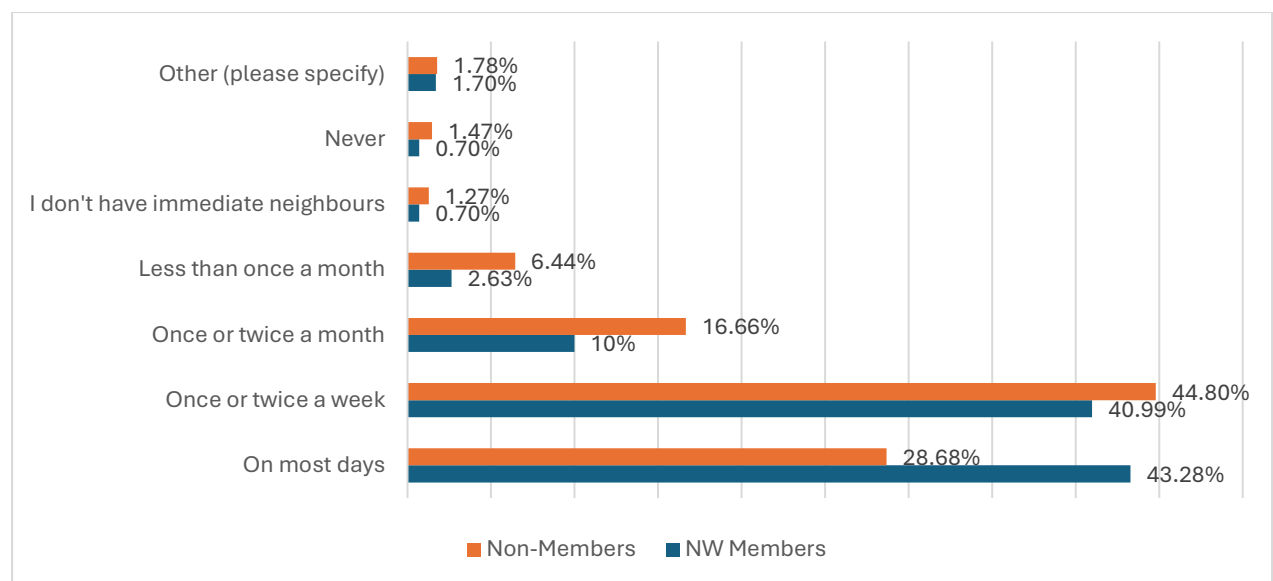
# Q11 How often do you chat to your neighbours

Looking at Neighbourhood Watch Members and Volunteers v non, there is a difference on the top category of speaking 'on most days' - our members are 15% more likely to do this.

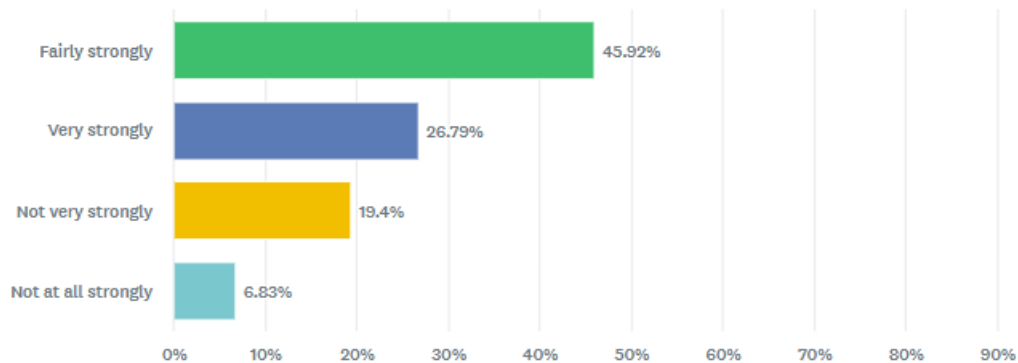




## Q12 – Strength of belonging

Looking at the levels of belonging (Very strongly and Fairly strongly), they are fairly level with last year's responses just a quarter of a percent down. Differences between gender are set out below:

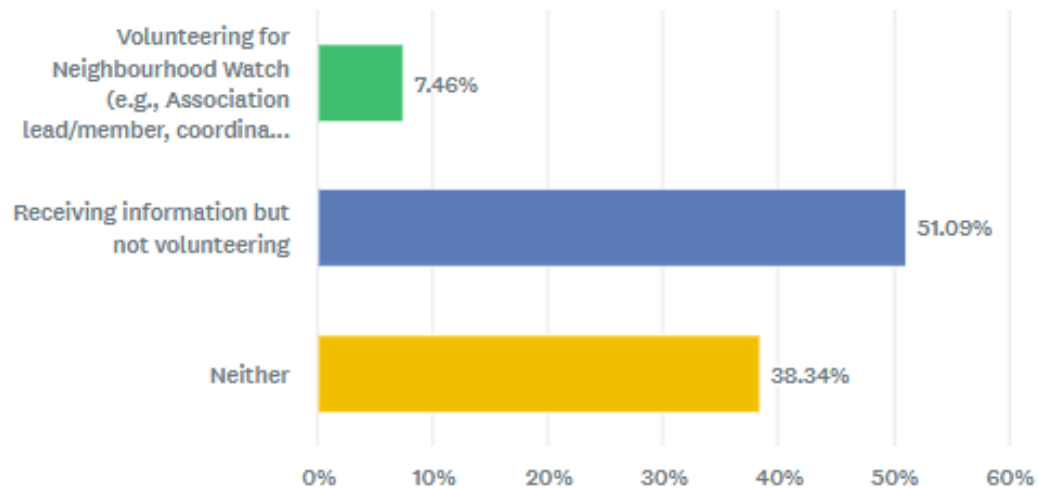

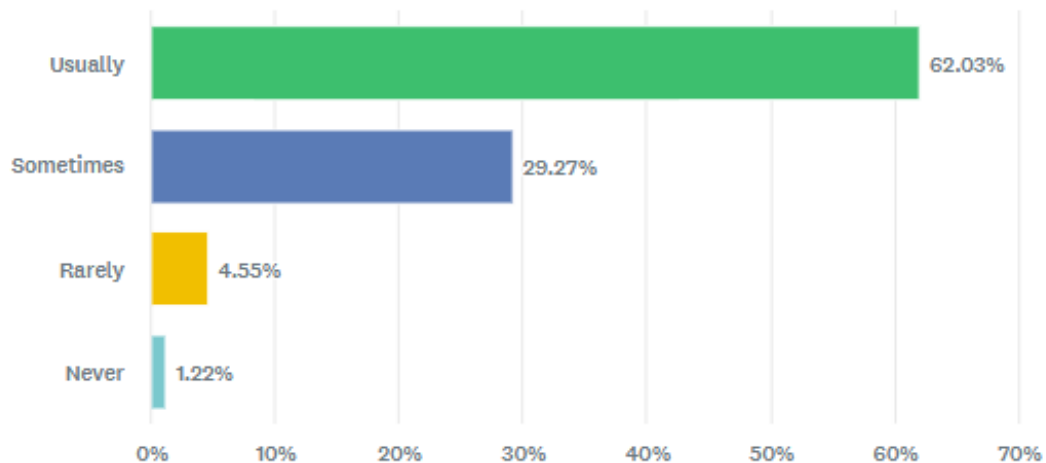

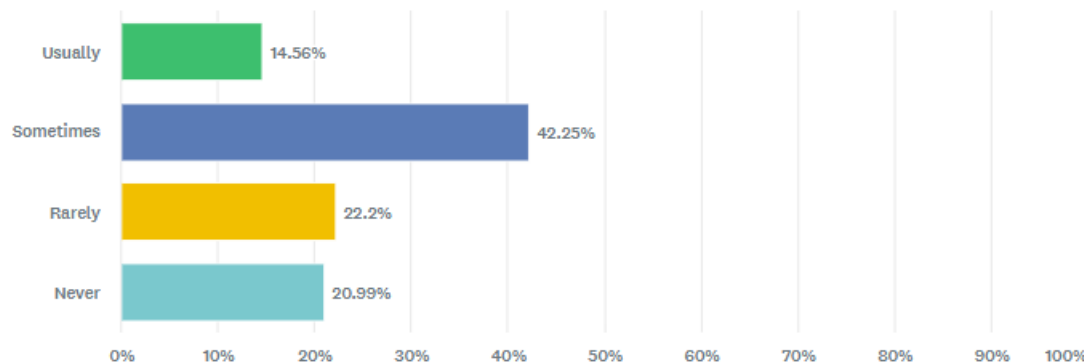


91.3% of respondents feel they would trust the crime prevention advice offered by Neighbourhood Watch which is exactly in line with the results for last year's survey.

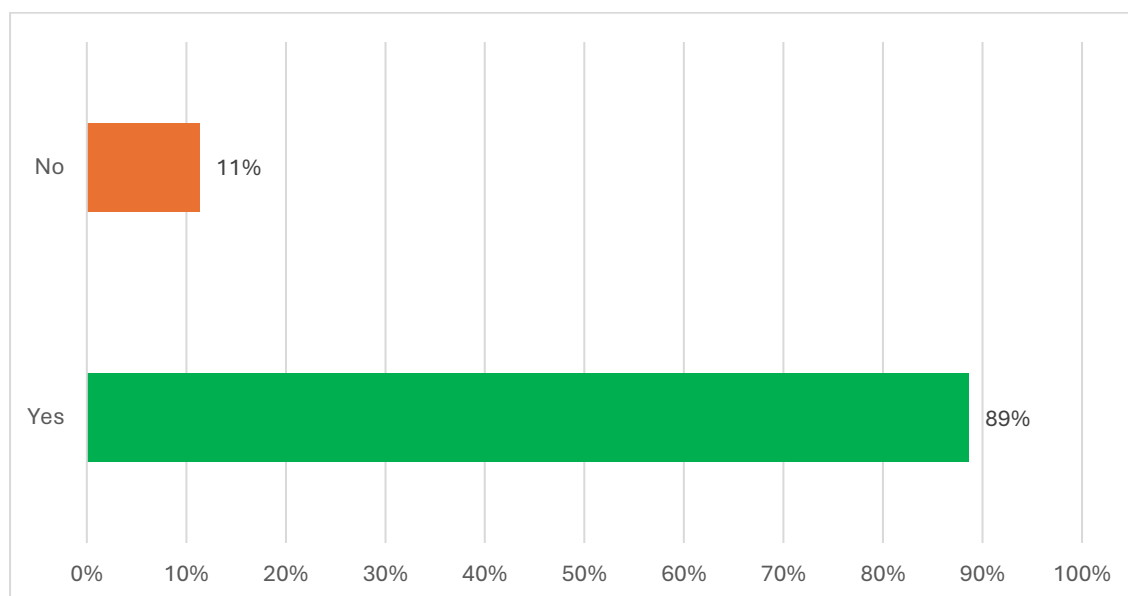


79% of respondents said they have acted on or changed their behaviour after engaging with our crime prevention advice/information. This is a slight improvement on last year's result which was 78%.

## Q18 Facial Recognition Technology

Facial Recognition Technology is being trialled in the UK by the police - do you support a public consultation on this?

This is the first time we have asked this question within this survey. UK facial recognition technology (FRT) is used by police for crime prevention, with types including Live (LFR), Retrospective (RFR), and Operator-Initiated (OIFR) apps, aiming for wider rollout but facing privacy concerns and documented accuracy issues for certain ethnicities, prompting new regulation discussions by the [Home Office](#) to balance security with civil liberties, while private companies also explore its use for shoplifting.

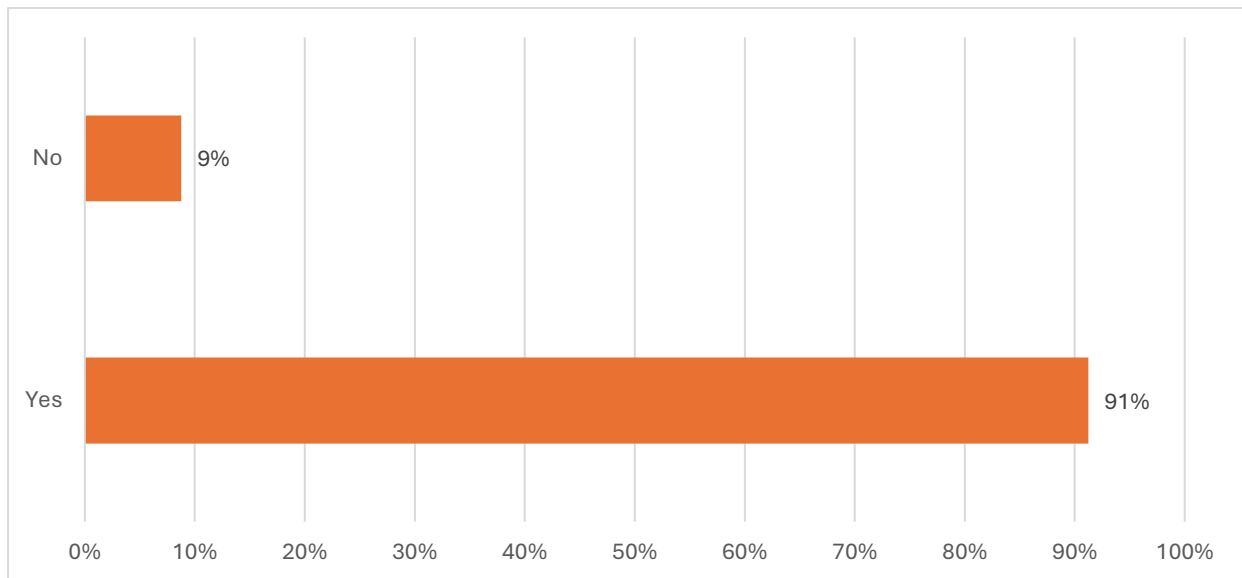
We wanted to test the water to see what level of appetite there was for the police to use this kind of technology in fighting crime and finding missing/vulnerable people. Increasingly, private CCTV is an option that householders (and indeed drivers) are utilising, and it feels like public opinion is moving closer towards embracing this, with 89%\* of respondents supporting a public consultation on the implementation of Facial Recognition Technology.

## Neutral

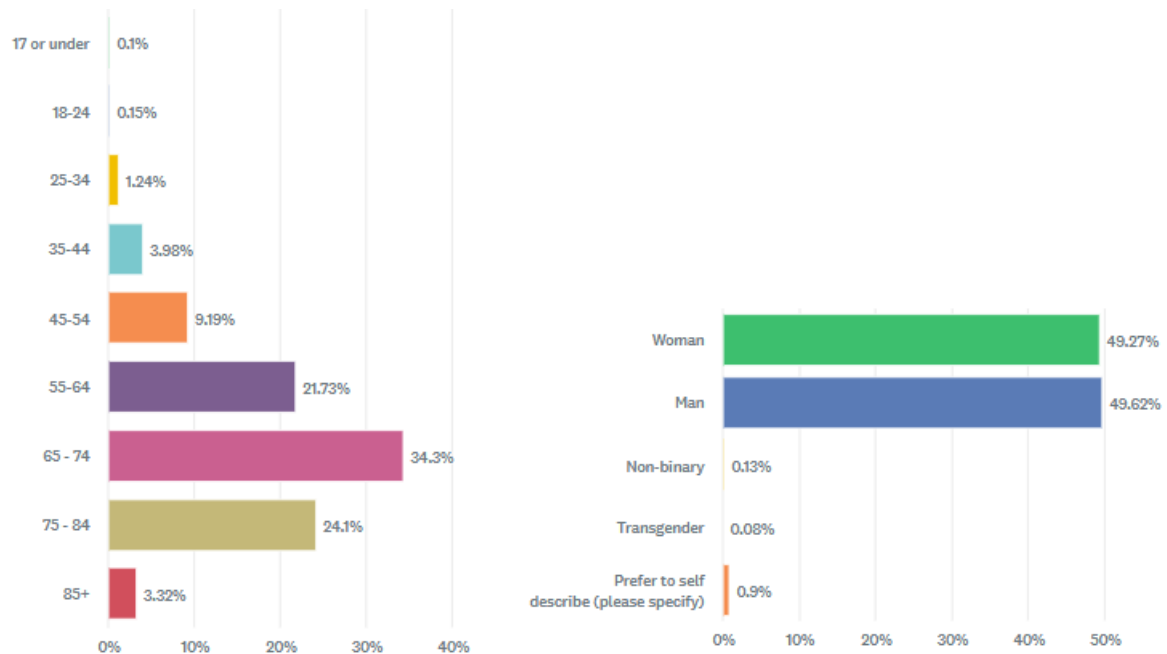
- Depends on the context it is being used in

- Orwellian and has no place in modern society

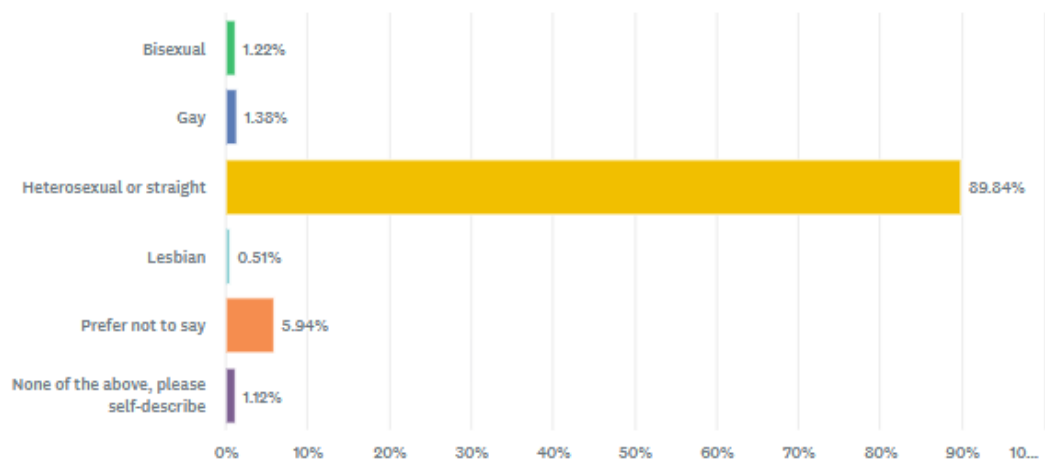

### Age / Gender



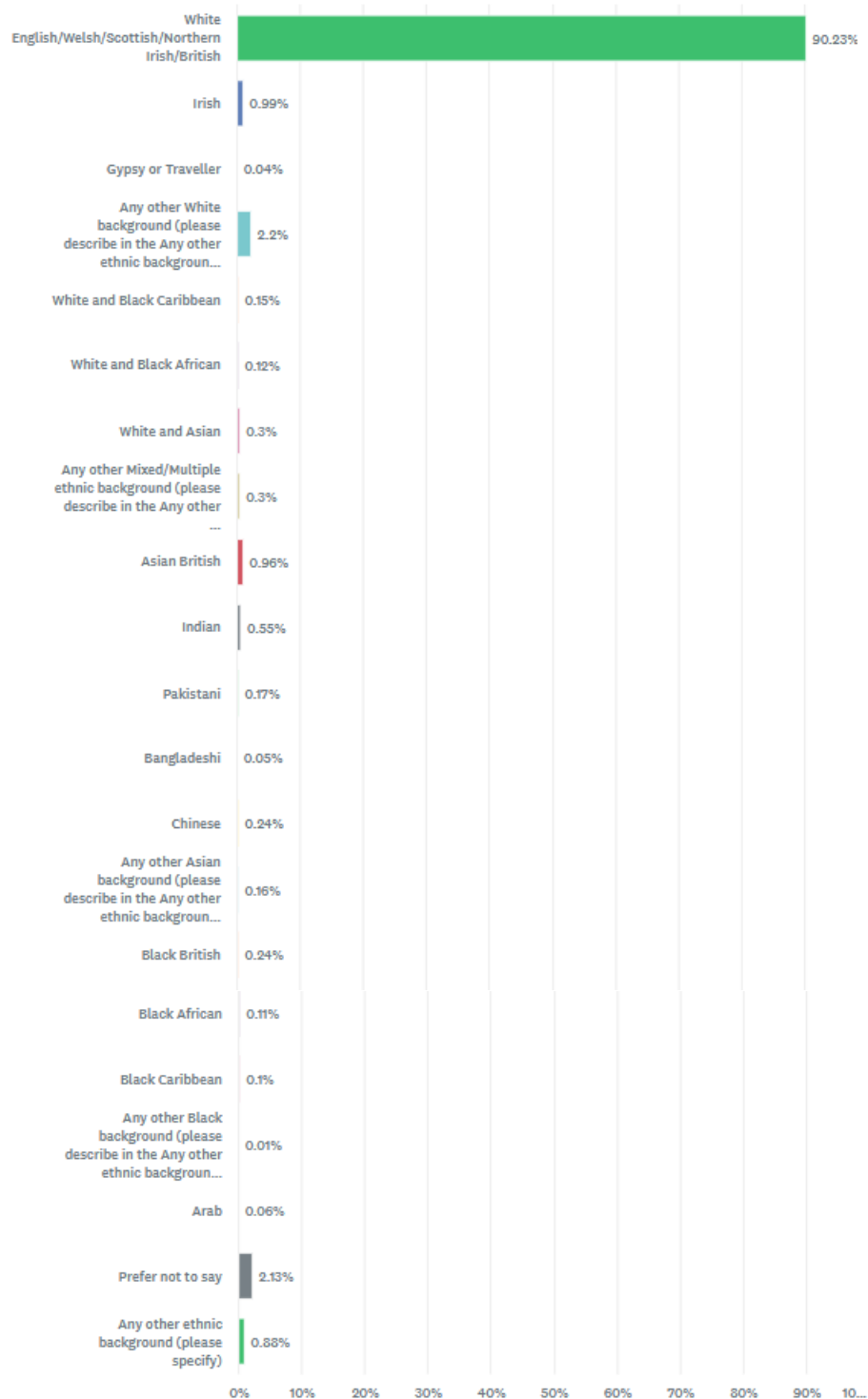
### What is your sexual orientation?

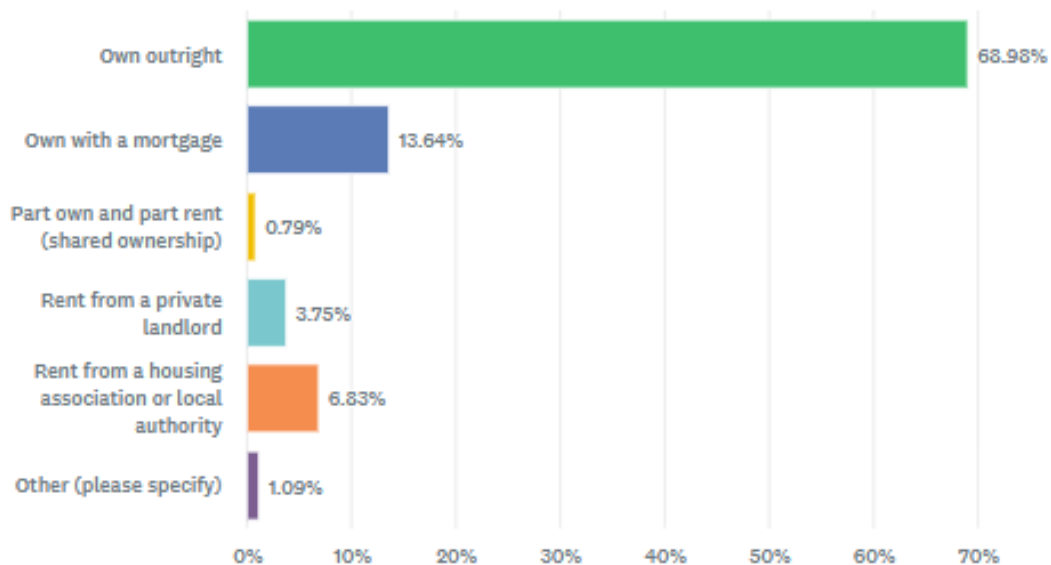
## Ethnic group

## Accommodation

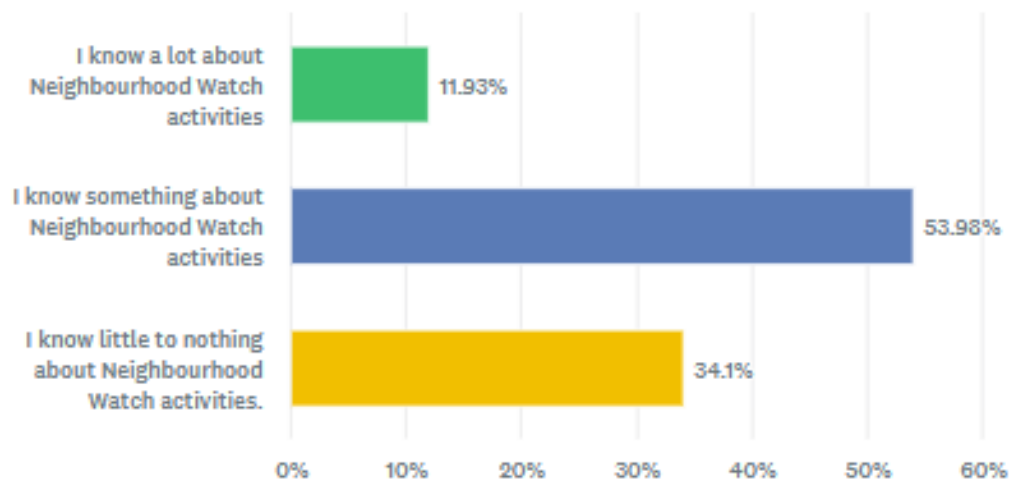
